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
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NYS FOUNDATION AND THE HUMANITARIAN AWARD DANIEL WILLIS

The New York State FBLA Foundation was incorporated and established as a separate entity in 2002. Its purpose being to hold fundraisers and raise money through donations and grants in order to facilitate the awarding of travel grants to NYS FBLA members in order for such members to participate in national competitions. The travel grants will assist in defraying the cost to members who represent New York State FBLA at the national conference.

The Foundation also sponsors the Humanitarian Award which initially was funded with a gift from North Dakota FBLA after the tragedy of 9/11. The New York State FBLA Foundation will continue to award three-\$150 SLC grants to three FBLA members who have demonstrated outstanding community service between July 1, 2016 and January 31, 2017. 
STEP UP AND LEAD BY ALANNA KRAMER

STYLES OF LEADERSHIP

In 1939, psychologist Kurt Lewin and some of his colleagues conducted a series of leadership decision experiments. Through these experiments, he discovered that there were three styles that continuously occurred. He dubbed these leadership styles autocratic, democratic, and laissez-faire. All of these styles are named for a style of government that you may have learned about in history class.

In an autocratic leadership, the leader makes all decisions, and there is no discourse allowed. There is no consultation involved in this style of leadership, which could obviously lead to some friction within the team, as people like feeling valued. This style of leadership may lead to high levels of discontent, as people enjoy having their opinions valued, and a leader could seem out of touch and unreasonable when assigning workloads and deadlines.

In a democratic leadership style, the people are involved in the decision making, although the leader may have final say in what actually occurs. This style tends to make people feel valued in their roles, which may lead to higher quality work in the long run. However, since everyone is given a chance to give their opinion, making decisions may start to take a longer amount of time than it would under an autocratic system.

In a laissez-faire system, leaders are minimally involved in decision making. Instead, people make their decisions from themselves, although they could be held responsible for the outcome of their work in some cases. This style of leadership could lead to assignments not being completed in a timely outcome, as people may create their own deadlines. None of these styles are superior to each other, although they each have their own pros and cons.

As FBLA members, many of us are in positions of leadership, so we should all consider these basic styles of leadership as well as any other behavior we have seen in effective leaders in the past in order to develop a style of leadership that works for ourselves as leaders as well as for those we lead.

NEW YORK JETS BUSINESS DAY


MINISINK VALLEY FBLA

WHAT MAKES HER A LEADER?



INSPIRATION: LEADERS IN ACTION

THE WALT DISNEY STORY

Throughout time spent in Disney, we all enjoy the parks and the hotels and the genuine hospitality that is part of the Disney experience.

But what do we know about the man who started it all? Wal Disney had humble beginnings. Met with failures around every corner, Disney did not back down in the pursuit of his dream. Motivation Mania brings us the story of Walt Disney.

Walt Disney's success story was full of painful events and failures.

When he returned from serving as a Red Cross volunteer in World War I, he'd had enough time to think about his future. He wanted to make cartoon motion pictures. So in 1920 he started his own company at the age of 19, drawing cartoons of the creatures from his childhood.

At the same time he had so little money to pay the rent, being forced to live with friends and often going without food. He failed to sell a single cartoon.

At the age of 22, he went bankrupt after the brutal failure of a cartoon series in Kansas City. He went bankrupt several times. He also wanted to become a Hollywood actor but it never happened. He was once fired by a newspaper editor who accused him of being lazy and lacking imagination and creative ideas.

Three years later he left Kansas City for Hollywood to pursue his childhood dream. He set up a studio in a converted garage and, after five years – a long time when he was without an income, he struck a little success with a short animation of 'Alice in Cartoonland' and 'Oswald the Rabbit'.

But again in 1928 some of his cartoonists left taking Oswald with them. Disney was shattered. His success was short lived and he returned to having nowhere to live and little money for food.

But his secret of success was within him. Out of the disaster he created his first Mickey Mouse character and, suddenly, he was on the road to real success.
