

NEW YORK STATE'S FBLA HISTORY

Future Business Leaders of America was founded in 1936 by Hamden L. Forkner of Columbia University. He envisioned FBLA providing a smooth transition from school to the business world. Today, this organization has grown to become the largest student business organization in the world with about 215,000 members.

New York State became a part of this truly remarkable organization in 1946 when Dobbs Ferry High School chartered the first chapter in the State. Eighteen years later, New York State received the 35th State Association Charter from the National Association on April 15, 1964. Thus we celebrate our 50th anniversary this year.



New York State FBLA was originally divided into thirteen districts. Each district boundaries were set up to correspond with the State Education Department Planning Regions. District 1, Long Island, was divided into District 1N and 1S due to increasing population. Later, District 3 was divided into District 3N and 3S, bringing the final total to fifteen districts.


In 1967, Mr. Hobart H. Conover, Chief of the Bureau of Business Education, became the New York State FBLA Chairperson. Mr. Elton T. Murphy, Associate of the Bureau, was named the first New York State Adviser.

In 1966, on the campus of the State University of New York Cobleskill, New York State FBLA and PBL held the first joint state conference. One year later, FBLA conducted its own State Leadership Conference (SLC) in the Catskill Mountain Region. On March 20, 1970 the University of the State of New York gave New York State FBLA an absolute charter.

The State Leadership Conference has been held in various locations throughout its fifty years. Currently, New York State FBLA has their conference at the Rochester Riverside Convention Center and Radisson Riverside Hotel.

Each year at State Leadership Conference, a new State Officer team is elected into office. The newly elected State Officers are required to attend a week-long summer workshop, State Officer Training (SOT). The first State Officer Training was held in 1969 at Camp Oswegatchie in Corghan, New York. Today, the summer leadership workshop is help at Christ the King Spiritual Life Center in Greenwich, New York.

NYS FBLA ORGANIZATIONAL CHART



State Chairperson: A member of the NYS Education Department who oversees the State Association citation and serves as the State Advisory Board Liaison.

Board of Trustees: An elected body of local FBLA Advisers who represent each of the fifteen districts.

State Advisory Board: Representatives from New York business and industry who serve as mentors and resources to local chapters, State Officers, and the entire NYS Association.

Professional Division: Businesspersons and community members working with New York FBLA at all levels.

State Officer Adviser: An appointed individual who directs and assists the State Officer Team with all of their activities.

State Executive Secretary: An appointed BOT member who oversees the organization of the State's activities.

State Officers: An elected body of members who coordinate all State and District activities.

Local Advisers: Business educators who guide and advise members of local chapters.

Local Officers: Local members whom are elected to coordinate activities on the local level.

Local Chapter Members: The backbone of the State Association, students grades 7-12 who conduct all FBLA activities.

NUMBER OF MEMBERS

New York State FBLA is divided into fifteen districts. Each district elects a vice president at the State Leadership Conference to preside over the activities throughout the year. SIZE OF STATE CHAPTER



New York State is the largest state in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States. It is the 27th largest state in the country, with a total of 54,475 square miles that include the Finger Lakes, Adirondack Mountains, and New York City. New York State is very diverse with busy urban centers, suburban communities, and rural agricultural areas.

In 2010, the US Census calculated New York's population at 19,421,055; making the state the third most populous state in the nation.

New York State has become a leader for industries with 52 Fortune various 500 companies headquartered within the state. Companies such as AOL-Time Warner. McGraw-Hill. Xerox, Citigroup, IBM. Verizon represent New York State and its success. New York State plays host to hundreds of smaller businesses, farms, and tourist attractions.

New York City serves as the state's economic anchor. A large amount of the state's revenue is generated from New York City, which houses Wall Street and New York Stock Exchange (the largest stock exchange in the world).

FBLA CHARITIES

2013-2014 National & State Charity: March of Dimes



Future Business Leaders of America has been working with and fundraising for the March of Dimes for nearly 40 years and has been consistently ranked as its top fundraising organization. During this time, FBLA has raised over \$15 million to assist in the research of the prevention of premature births.

There are various ways to become actively involved in promoting March of Dimes and the awareness of premature birth rates. One way FBLA helps is hosting a Blue Jeans for Babies dance at all National Conferences. We also participate in the March for Babies Walk at the National Leadership Conference in the summer.

Over the summer, the New York State Officer Team voted March of Dimes as our official 2013-2014 State Charity. As a part of the Community Service Committee's Program of Work, there are two competitions that ask members to donate their time and to fundraise for this charity: Baby Bucks and March [of Dimes] Madness.

PRODUCTIVITY



RECRUITMENT OF MEMBERS AND CHAPTERS

At the week-long State Officer Training each summer, the State Officer Team and the Board of Trustees work diligently to develop the Program of Work for local chapters. Each officer works with one of four committees to create common goals for the year. The Membership Committee focuses on recruiting new members. activating. reactivating chapters. This year the committee set two goals: to increase membership to 4,000 and to increase chapters by 10. They also implemented a special 50th anniversary goal: to increase State Conference Leadership attendance bν 50 members to equal 600. The committee set three competitions to complete these goals.

State Officer Outreach

Every year the State Officers are asked to write at least ten recruitment letters and send them to schools that do not have active chapters. After the letters are sent to the schools, the officers personally call a school administrator as a follow-up. Several of these calls led to visitations this year where the officer presented a recruitment slideshow or video in front of the Board of Education or business class. This is an excellent way to get students interested and start an FBLA chapter in the school.



Early Bird Membership

Along with Nationals, New York State participates in Early Bird Membership. Chapters have to register and pay the dues of at least five members by October 15. This allows officers an opportunity to forecast which schools will have active chapters. Chapters who participate are recognized at the State Leadership Conference in April.



Race for Recruitment

In order to qualify for Race for Recruitment, a member must recruit at least five students. This competition is available for FBLA and Middle-Level chapters. Each qualifying participant received a certificate at the State Leadership Conference and their chapter received "Race for Recruitment" ribbons. The member who recruited the most students to join FBLA was awarded a plaque at the State Leadership Conference.

Chapter Charter Challenge

The Membership Committee challenged chapters within New York State FBLA to charter or reactivates a chapter near their school. Carmel High School was awarded a plaque at State Leadership Conference for recruiting three chapters. All participating chapters, including new chapters, wore a "Chapter Charter Challenge" ribbon at the SLC.

STATE OFFICER ASSISTANCE TO LOCAL CHAPTERS

Last April, New York State FBLA elected thirteen dedicated members to lead the State Association for the 2013-2014 FBLA year. In addition, a Parliamentarian is appointed based on the Parliamentary Procedure Exam and an interview with a selection committee. State Officers are elected from the members of New York State to serve as a resource for the Program of Work and for the local chapter members across the state.

Chapter Directory

Anita Halstead, the State Executive Secretary, created a statewide chapter directory. This directory included the contact information for all chapters' advisers and presidents. It was distributed to the Officer Team for use during the year when planning activities and disseminating information.

Fall District Meetings

Each fall, the State Vice Presidents conduct Fall District Meetings for their respective districts. These meetings are planned along with the Board of Trustee member from that particular district to provide members with a variety of workshops. Some examples include Parliamentary Procedure, the Program of Work, team-building activities, leadership skills, and FBLA 101. The State Officers communicate daily to assist each other with arranging these meetings. Often state officers from one district will attend another's Fall District Meeting to assist and provide more variety to the meeting.



President's Meeting

Many of the State Vice Presidents held meetings with their local Chapter Presidents at the Fall District Meeting. These meetings provided an informal forum through which activities and ideas could be discussed. Issues discussed often included fundraising, community service, and membership recruitment. These meetings also served as a great resource for the State Officer Team as they received feedback on projects and events at the district and state levels.

State Website

The New York State FBLA website, www.nysfbla.org, is maintained by Mrs. Jennifer Judge. It has proven to be valuable asset to the State Chapter. With New York's commitment to minimize the use of paper and postage, all communications are posted on the NYS Website. Each officer has their own page on the website so members can see updates posed by the officers. In addition, each State Officer and Board of Trustee member has a state e-mail address.

PREPARATION OF STATE AND LOCAL OFFICERS FOR THEIR DUTIES

State Officer Training



In July, the State Officer Team attended State Officer Training at Christ the King Center in Greenwich, NY. During this eventful week, each of the officers learned the duties specific to their office. The officers attended informative workshops presented by alumni and Board of Trustee members. These workshops included professional image, job interview skills, time management, effective leadership skills, and parliamentary procedure.

The first decisions of the Officer Team revolved around choosing the state theme, charity and goals. After much thoughtful debate, "Celebrating 50 Years of Excellence" was chosen to be the 2013-2014 State Theme. The Officer Team choose to adopt March of Dimes as the 2013-2014 State Charity. With the theme and charity chosen, the members of each of the four standing committees developed their program of work.

The Officer Team spent a full day learning about two other Career and Technical Student Oranizations (CTSO); Future Farmers of America and Skills USA sent representatives. Everyone exchanged fundraising ideas, publicity actions and common goals. This was a great way to conclude the State Officer Training and begin the 2013-2014 New York State FBLA year!

State Officer Evaluations

During the FBLA year, the State Officers were each evaluated three times by a committee from the Board of Trustees. The State President evaluated each mainline officer monthly and Executive Vice President evaluated each State Vice President monthly. These evaluations contain rubrics specific to each office and time of year.

Joint Meetings



During the week in Greenwich, the State Officers and Board of Trustees members met to finalize the state theme, charity, and Program of Work. They met again in January to finalize the State Leadership Conference, giveaways, and workshops. This meeting also gave the Officer Team an opportunity to reflect on their success so far and plan for the remaining year.

COOPERATION WITH BUSINESS, PROFESSIONAL, AND SERVICE GROUPS

One of the goals of FBLA is to facilitate the transition between high school students with the business world. Members can gain skills, though workshops, which cannot be given to them though a textbook. These skills help our FBLA members succeed in their future endeavors.

Advisory Board

The New York State Advisory Board is comprised of representatives from businesses throughout the state. They participate in activities that range from local chapter meetings to the State Leadership Conference. In addition, they support local chapter advisers, serve as judges, contacts to businesses, and speakers.

Professional Division

The business professionals and alumni who make up the Professional Division play an important role in the success of our local chapters and our State Association. Members of

The Professional Division participates by serving as judges, workshop presenters, guest speakers, and providing job shadowing opportunities.

Community Service

One of the main goals of FBLA is to participate in community service. To encourage members to participate, the Community Service Committee sponsored competitions to recognize FBLA chapters who are active in their communities. While developing the Program of Work, the Community Service Committee set a goal to raise \$7,500 for the March of Dimes.

Conference Exhibits

At the State Leadership Conference, businesses, and fundraising companies, set up booths to promote aspects of business that may intrigue FBLA members to attend the conference. The businesses talk about their products and services.

PARTICIPATION IN PUBLIC RELATIONS ACTIVITIES AND NEWSPAPER PREPARATION

District Publications

A duty of the State Vice Presidents is to publish four editions of a district newsletter. These newsletters contain articles written by FBLA members, the other State Officers, and Program of Work committees. The newsletters are used to inform members of district events, projects, and conferences.

The FBLA Express

The State Reporter publishes four issues of the New York State newsletter, *The FBLA Express*. These issues contain information on events at the local, district, state, and national levels as well as competitive event winners, committee updates, and articles written by State Officers. The articles focus on how chapters can get involved in the Program of Work and run a successful chapter. Each edition is posted to the State Website.

DEVELOPMENT AND PROMOTION OF FBLA-PBL STATE PROJECTS

The State Officers work on one of four standing committees: Community Service, Go Green, Membership, and Publicity. Each committee develops goals and contests for local chapters and members that form the Program of Work. The winners are recognized at the State Leadership Conference in April. Throughout the year, the committee members communicate with the state membership and encourage all members to work toward attaining the goals set forth.

Community Service Committee

The goals of the Community Service Committee were to:

- Raise \$7,500 for the state charity, March of Dimes
- Encourage volunteer work to increase member involvement in chapters

To achieve these goals, the Community Service Committee implemented these contests: Baby Bucks, and March [of Dimes] Madness.

Membership Committee

The goals of the Membership Committee were to:

- Increase NYS FBLA membership to 4,000
- Increase NYS FBLA chapters by 10
- Special 50th Anniversary goal: Increase NYS FBLA SLC attendance by 50

To achieve these goals, the Membership Committee implemented three contests: Early Bird Membership, Race for Recruitment and Chapter Charter Challenge.

Publicity Committee

The goals of the Publicity Committee were to:

- Expand NYS FBLA social media footprint
- Increase awareness of NYS FBLA

To achieve these goals, the Publicity Committee implemented these contests: Snap Shot and Perfect Press.

Go Green Committee

The goals of the Go Green Committee were to:

- Increase chapter participation in making their local communities better, cleaner and greener
- Educate local communities on the practicality and economic importance of going green

To achieve these goals, the Go Green Committee implemented these contests: Spruce It Up and Teaching Green.

President's Golden Leader Award



Steven Youssef, State President, created the President's Golden Leader Award. This competition is to recognize those chapters that go above and beyond by participating in each of the four sections of the Program of Work as well as Membership Mania, Community Cooperation, Golden Image, and the Grass is Greener on the Other Side.

Chapters across the state participated in various activities on American Enterprise Day, November 15. Some chapters invited local small business owners to speak to business classes on the advantages and disadvantages of entrepreneurship. IMPLEMENTATION OF STATE

CONFERENCES

All members are encouraged to attend all district, state and national conferences. These conferences provide students with an opportunity to network, learn, and compete with fellow FBLA members.

Fall District Meetings

In the month of October, the State Vice Presidents held their Fall District Meetings. During these meetings a keynote speaker kicks off the opening session. After this opening session, members attend informative workshops that are presented by Professional Division members, State Officers, state staff and other local business leaders. All State Vice Presidents present the Program of Work during this meeting to ensure that chapters are aware of the goals for the year.

National Fall Leadership Conference



In November, New York State FBLA attended the Cleveland, Ohio NFLC. All members were encouraged to attend workshops presented by Professional Division members, motivational speakers and other professionals. New York State also held a state meeting at NFLC where members were reminded about the Program of Work and State Leadership Conference.

Spring District Meeting

In February, each district conducted a Spring District Meeting. At these meetings, members compete in the first round of competitions. Basic Decision Making, Client Service, Future Business Leader, Impromptu Speaking, Job Interview, Parliamentary Procedure, and Public Speaking I, and Public Speaking II winners advance to the State Leadership Conference. Members who plan to run for state office must take the State Officer Exam at this meeting. Several districts also offer written tests, similar to those offered at the SLC, to provide members with additional experience before they compete on the state level.

State Leadership Conference

Six hundred thirty-two members and advisers from chapters across the state attended the 2014 State Leadership Conference (SLC) held on April 9-11 at the Rochester Riverside Convention Center in Rochester, NY. This conference marked the conclusion of a year of success and achievement for NYS FBLA. The state theme, Celebrating 50 Years of Excellence, was the ideal theme for congratulating New York State on fifty years as a state chapter. SLC featured over forty competitive events for members as well as workshops presented by the State Officer Team. The general sessions were engaging and featured the state officer farewells. campaign speeches, slideshows, and awards. During the award ceremony, the first, second, and third places of each event received a travel grant to represent NYS FBLA at the National Leadership Conference in Nashville. Tennessee this summer.



CHAPTER MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATION

Goals and Committees

Each year, it is the responsibility of the State Officer Team to develop the goals that will guide the basic structure of the FBLA year. To accomplish each of the goals, the State Officers worked in one of four committees: Membership, Community Service, Publicity, and Go Green. Each committee had a chairperson, speaker, and members. Throughout the year, these committees planned events, published articles, and posted to the state website.

Agendas

For each meeting with the State Officer Team, the State President Steven Youssef, created an agenda. The agenda included the reading of the previous meeting's minutes, mainline officer reports, standing committee reports, special committee reports, unfinished business, new business, and announcements. This procedure is identical to one that the State Association recommends for local chapter use and Robert's Rules of Order.

Minutes

It was the duty of the State Secretary Mary Golden to keep complete and accurate minutes of the business that took place during the monthly teleconferences and at each Joint Meeting of the State Officer team and the Board of Trustees. After these meetings, she prepared the minutes and distributed them in a timely manner.

Plan of Action

On the first of every month, each State Officer was required to set objectives that they hoped to accomplish in the upcoming month. This is known as the Plan of Action. At the end of each month, each officer evaluated their work on these objectives. Officers rated themselves on a scale of 0-5. They took into account efficiency, timelines and professionalism. These proved extremely useful for the officers with regards to setting goals and meeting deadlines.

Monthly Activity Reports

In addition to completing their monthly Plan of Action (POA), the State Officers were each required to send Monthly Activity Reports (MAR). The MAR is an essay-type report that describes, in detail, the progress made within the month based on the POA submitted on the first of that month. This report also allows the officers to communicate the personal issues that are happening in their lives, such as SATs and college applications. This proved extremely helpful to the Board of Trustees so that they knew what each officer was completing.

Parliamentary Procedure

The State Parliamentarian Kelsie O'Flanagan, was responsible for seeing that all meetings of the NYS FBLA Association ran in accordance with Parliamentary Procedure as stated in Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised. The Parliamentarian's second major responsibility was to encourage all members to learn and use parliamentary procedure at their local meetings. To accomplish this, she wrote articles for *The FBLA Express*, New York State's newsletter.

FINANCIAL DEVELOPMENT

Dues

The primary funding of New York State FBLA activities comes from membership dues which every member has to pay. The state dues for 2013-2014 were \$6 per member. Dues were utilized by the State Association to pay for such necessities as the management of State Leadership Conference, supplies, and travel expenses.

Saving Money

This year NYS FBLA went green to save money by utilizing the state website more. Correspondences were posted to the website rather than being mailed. These documents included the Program of Work, *The FBLA Express*, directories, and conference registration packets. In addition, state officers submitted all of their monthly correspondences electronically to their evaluators.

New York State Foundation

The New York State Foundation is a trust fund set up specifically to defray National Leadership Conference costs for New York State FBLA competitive event winners. The Foundation has an annual board meeting at the SLC and maintains accounts separate from the State Association.

Interest in State Checking Account

All money received by the New York State Association during the FBLA fiscal year is deposited into an interest-bearing checking account. Interest is then added to the balance on the account as it is calculated. Money may be withdrawn only through checks written by the State Executive Treasurer.

Conference Registration Fees

At each state conference and district meetings, a registration fee is built into the total cost of the conference for each member. Fees are utilized to help defray conference expenses.

Sponsorships and Donations

Many businesses and individuals sponsor competitive event winners at the State April. Leadership Conference in Local businesses also make generous donations to many of the local chapters throughout the state to support their members and their Program of Work.
