



Why is Parliamentary Procedure Important

Imagine your typical chapter meeting. Members are filing in at random, people are talking when officers are trying to speak, and there is a general air of hectic confusion. Now, imagine the perfect chapter meeting. The room is near-silent, the session is conducted according to a plan, and each issue is properly and thoroughly discussed by the members. Can meetings truly be operated this way? With parliamentary procedure, they can! Parliamentary procedure is a system for conducting business in an equal and organized manner. In the case of the typical chapter meeting described above, the status of the members and officers was clearly not equal; as a result, the lack of information being provided to members could leave them feeling insignificant to their chapter. "Insignificant," members are less likely to attend chapter meetings, which makes membership retention and recruitment of students for community service events immensely difficult. This downward spiral can be avoided by simply teaching members how to properly plan and participate in chapter meetings.


Chapter officers and members should observe the stark differences between the two contrasting scenarios described earlier and learn to implement them in their own meetings. These differences are simple aspects of parliamentary procedure that could have a profound impact on chapter meetings. To begin with, officers should learn, teach and enforce basic parliamentary procedure to their members so that only one person is speaking at a time. When only one person has the floor, it is much easier for everyone to not only hear what is being said, but also offer their own input. Chapter officers and members should also consider designing an agenda. If officers plan a detailed agenda in advance, having that on hand during the meeting can be incredibly helpful in keeping them on track and keeping members informed on what exactly will be discussed. Once members believe that their voice is being heard, they could feel influential in their chapter meetings and will be more likely to return. Once "influential," members become more comfortable with parliamentary procedure, they can begin to use it as a tool to shape their meetings in becoming even more democratic and will find its impact everlasting when they advance their




