I hope all of you are having a great FBLA experience so far with your Fall District Meeting and for some of you, the National Fall Leadership Conference (NFLC) in Washington, D.C.! Washington D.C. was the first of three NFLCs for the year and it was an out of this world experience.

The conference was held through November 1-2, 2019. It included outstanding workshops that ranged from Networking to Creating an FBLA Family and Navigating the New Database. All of the workshops presented were very informative as they presented knowledge FBLA members could use in their lives. There were two general sessions with all of the attendees from across the nation. The two keynote speakers had incredible presentations with moving words that we all loved hearing about. There were also five New York FBLA State Officers present: Jillian Bent, Dante Howard, Zoe Hanfmann, and Madeleine Biles, and myself. We all helped in leading the New York State meeting held on Friday evening. The officers showed a presentation of pictures of members partaking in FBLA events from across the state so far this year. Additionally, we encouraged members to further their involvement by participating in State Councils, the Program of Work, or maybe even running for state office.

I hope those of you who attended NFLC had a great experience and took advantage of all of the opportunities there. I highly recommend attending any of the national conferences as they are a way for you to get involved, network, partake in community service events, compete in events, and explore the area!

Past, Present, and Future Social Media Initiatives Jillian Bent

Social media is like a bridge, it allows communication and access to resources that otherwise couldn't be grasped. It connects us with the world and it offers a better perspective to help thrive in our environment. Like social media, FBLA offers a network and opportunities to help students develop themselves while competing and meeting other members.

Bringing FBLA and social media together creates an amplified platform to bring greater success through stronger connections. National FBLA, as well as New York State FBLA, both created initiatives to help members transition into effective media users. Starting in 2018, National FBLA created the first-ever Social Media Ambassadors (SMAs) program which served during the 2018 National Leadership Conference and the months leading up to it. SMAs assist in creating graphics, videos, and other posts about FBLA on the official social media pages. Since then, every year there are two terms, each approximately four months long, where members can serve as an ambassador.

Another initiative on the national pages is Sixty Second Sunday. Sixty Second Sunday is a video interview where members talk about something FBLA related and share the information in the interview. These range from explaining BAAs, networking, chapter challenges, and even social media. If you want to participate in either of these you can contact a national officer or look for applications on the national Instagram and Twitter pages.

New York State FBLA established social media accounts in 2016, and since then have made hundreds of posts and many activities for members to partake in through social media. Past initiatives include Program of Work Wednesday, FBLA trivia, and State Officer Sunday. This year we have brought back State Officer Sunday, introducing a new officer every week. We also created a competition called Instagram Idols, that can earn chapters recognition at the State Leadership Conference! Instagram Idols is a monthly challenge that includes various activities like community service, attending FDM, and chapter meetings. Chapters have to submit picture evidence of completing the tasks assigned in that month and earn recognition at the end of the month, but also potentially at the SLC!

Social media is a fast-paced, rapidly changing gateway of resources and connections to everything. Using platforms like Instagram and Twitter in FBLA helps chapters not only document the work they accomplish throughout the membership year but also publicize and recognize what their members do every day. To help your chapter become more active, consider creating a chapter Instagram and participating in social media initiatives.

The Humanitarian Award

As a person, and especially as a member of FBLA, it is extremely important to give back to others. Not everyone is fortunate enough to live comfortably as most of us do, and many families struggle to even put food on their tables. Though it may not seem like it, any time spent doing community service has a big impact. Every year, the New York State FBLA Foundation likes to recognize those members that went above and beyond to help their community with the Humanitarian Award. This award is a \$150 State Leadership Conference grant that is awarded to three FBLA members who have demonstrated outstanding community service. In order to be eligible for this award, members must be registered for the 2019-2020 FBLA year and must participate in community service activities between the dates of July 19, 2019 and January 31, 2020. Grant recipients must attend the 2020 State Leadership Conference and winners will be notified by the end of February in 2020. Any member can apply for this grant; however, only one member per chapter can be chosen to receive the award. If you wish to apply, the application is available on the New York State FBLA website, nysfbla.org. The application requires a 250-word essay about your community service endeavors as well as a written statement from the overseer of your community service activities. The application must be completed and sent to Ms. Gloria LaSota, postmarked no later than January 31, 2020. I encourage you all to give back to your community and your neighbors, and to ask yourself, "How have I helped others less fortunate than myself?"

Why Compete at Your Spring District Meeting Dante Howard

You may be wondering what it takes to become a state parliamentarian. I'll tell you about one part of the process: competing at your Spring District Meeting (SDM). The Spring District Meeting has several competitive events to participate in along with the regular workshops. Competing at SDM adds excitement to the event and can be a smart strategy for doing well at SLC

.For several individual events you can get first, second, and third place trophies for competing at SDM. Along with a quick reward, placing in these competitions lets you know how you will do in the same competition at SLC. If you're unsure about whether or not you're ready to make the trip to SLC, competing at SDM is a great way to see if going to SLC is worth it.

SDM also offers competitions of taking a test for qualification for states. As I competed in parliamentary procedure the past two years, my team and I were required to take a parliamentary procedure test in order to qualify for states. The great part about taking the test at SDM was getting to know right after whether we would place in the competition at states. If we qualified from the test, we would automatically be in the top 5 participants. Taking the test two months before SLC also gave us valuable time to practice new skills and study after knowing the parliamentary procedure information from the test. Competitions at SDM offer great ways of spacing out your preparation time. Another important event at SDM is the state officer exam.

All state officer candidates are required to take this test at SDM and get a passing grade in order to advance. In addition to the state officer exam, my score on the parliamentary procedure test also factored into whether or not I was appointed as the state parliamentarian. As I took both at SDM competing there was a significant part of my journey towards becoming a state officer. If you're looking for a good entry level competition, competing at SDM is the perfect place to start. I encourage everyone to check out their SDM and try a competition!


